Winter does slow things down for most lodges due to weather, etc. But all lodges did get their new officers elected and installed and reports sent in. Also got the info to all of them regarding the new dues structure for 2018.

Hjemdahl (Valley City) are really doing a great job with their newly rejuvenated lodge with several new members which they are continuing to get! They are having short business meetings then cultural programs and skits for entertainment-- a lot of interest going. They are looking at getting vests for the members-hopefully for the convention. Their social/cultural director has been introducing the lodge to different Norwegian goodies, like Glogg, two kinds of lefse and the heart shaped waffles. They had a lesson on Trolls at a meeting. So they are putting some fun & excitement in their meetings! I am so proud of them.

Kringen (Fargo) are continuing to stay busy with meals served at noon Monday-Friday and also on Tuesday nights for their social nights. They had lutefisk & meatball dinners one Sunday a month November-April with very good attendance. Spring starts another eight week session of Norwegian language classes with different levels being taught. They have a youth group that meets some Saturdays. They continue with an accordion band & Kor group of singers, plus a dance group. The District folk dance workshop was held at Kringen lodge in March. They continue to send out the "Posten" newsletter monthly to their members. They started a luncheon & social opportunity on Thursdays called "Stitch Group" when they do any of their handiwork & socialize. They have a schedule of bus tours available again this year. They also have "book discussion" once a month open to anyone & cultural night once a month. This year they have been doing a class on Hardanger as well. They will be doing a special night for Syttende Mai with meal & entertainment.

Henrik Ibsen (Wahpeton) did not meet in January or February but started up again at Frying Pan in March and they meet the 2nd Thursday at 4 pm with a meal & meeting and usually something cultural as well. They are planning a big open house special night at the Bragg Farm in May. They are trying to get out to the public with special meals and entertainment. In the fall they had a special night of Norwegian waffles & their local paper which was a good advertisement for them too! They are sending one delegate to the District Convention, with the lodge paying the registration. Their president may go to the International Convention as a visitor. He was going to the District as a delegate but is a pastor and now not able to go after all. They are a small lodge—did have two members pass away this year so that was too bad.

Ueland (Cooperstown) has been having their kumla suppers 5-6 times again this year. They have lots of fun as a lodge working together to put them on & get good attendance. It is a good money maker-helps pay the bills! The cultural things done were well attended as well with the president demonstrating carving a Norwegian wooden chain, for one. Had a night of making greeting cards and also demonstration & hands on for paper folding hearts, etc. Also had one movie night at the lodge. They will do a special Norwegian meal and invite others to come to see them receive a plaque from International. They have two delegates and six alternates for the District convention in Bismarck.

Russ (graduating students) have their own parade later in the day, although there is a sprinkling of russ students in their trademark overalls in the morning parade. Who Would Have Thought? Easter and crime novels and munchies?

It's a unique Norwegian tradition that started back in the 1920s and has continued up to present day. Norwegians even have a name for it: Pascha Krim. Translated, it means "Easter Crime," said Toni Little, one of the organizers of a Friday night presentation about the custom.

Little will serve as the emcee for the free 7 p.m. event sponsored by the Sons of Norway. It will take place at American Lutheran Church, 5 Lewis Ave. The evening will feature speakers Diana Rogers, Liv Halvorson and Sue Johnson. It will also include snacks enjoyed by Norwegians during Pascha Krim and a discussion of some of Scandinavia's popular crime authors.

The whole Easter Crime phenomenon began back in 1923, Little said, when two men, Nordahl Grieg and Nils Lie, wrote a novel about a bank robbery. "They were excited about it and wanted to promote it," Little said. "So they wrote it as if it was an actual robbery and that went into the newspaper." Readers believed the robbery was real, she said. When they found out the crime was the plot of a novel, "they bought the book."

One thing led to another, and now Norwegians take a long weekend off at Easter. Many travel to their cabins to relax, where they read crime novels or watch TV crime shows.

And they enjoy foods that range from oranges "because that's the fruit of spring," Little said, to orange soda, hard-boiled eggs and a chocolate bar called Kvikk Lunsj.

"It means 'quick lunch' and it's a lot like our Kit Kat," she said. "And they like orange cake.": 0% Norwegians love to read, she said. As proof, all three women belong to a monthly book club in which they earn pins for reading.

"We've been doing this two or three years," Rogers said.

Members meet at Barnes & Noble on the fourth Saturday of the month. The focus is on Scandinavian literature.

It's a matter of encouraging each other, Halvorson

said, and creating an interest in new books the others haven't yet read. Each person reads a book of his or her choosing and then talks about it at the gathering.

The local Sons of Norway group has a library of about 200 books by Norwegian authors, translated into English. They are kept at St. Andrew Presbyterian Church, 180 N. 24th St. W., and members of the public are welcome to stop by and read them.

At the monthly book club meetings, the group also chooses topics to focus on. One gathering focused on Iceland, "a major part of Norwegian history," Little said.

"And they have wonderful Christmas stories," she said. "And then we had one on alcoholism in Norway, so we have different subjects."

On Friday night, Rogers will talk about Jo Nesbø, author of a popular crime series whose book, "The Snowman," was recently turned into a movie. She will also talk about author Karin Fossum, another Norwegian author of crime fiction.

Halvorson will focus on Henning Mankell, the Swedish author of the Kurt Wallander novels turned into a TV series. Johnson will focus on literature related to immigration.
