Hello! My name is Martha (Larsen) Cederwall. I was born in Kenora, Ontario in 1956 and was raised in Keewatin, Ontario, a small town 4 miles away. My parents came from Norway (Alesund area) and moved to Keewatin after they married in 1952. They could not speak English when they moved to Canada. I have one older sister, Ingrid, and one younger brother, Harald. In 1960 my family moved to Norway and we lived there for almost 2 years before moving back to Keewatin in 1962.

I attended elementary school in Keewatin and high school in Kenora. After high school I worked for almost 3 years in clerical work positions.

In 1978 I married my "high school sweetheart", Dale, and we moved to Calgary to begin our new life together where Dale was just starting his first job as a geologist after graduating from university. I worked for almost 5 years as a secretary before we started our family in 1983. I have 3 grown children....2 girls (Janelle and Lindsay) and 1 boy (Daniel) and also 4 grandchildren. While raising my children I was a stay-at-home mom. I volunteered a lot in the schools that my children attended from elementary through high school.

I enjoy sewing, gardening and baking. When the children were young we did a lot of camping.

We have travelled through western Europe. When my youngest daughter was a schoolteacher in the United Arab Emirates for 4 years we would meet her each spring in Europe on her break and we travelled to Italy, Switzerland, Belgium, Germany, Holland, Luxemburg and Austria. 

If you're planning on going to Host Fest in Minot,

There is camping available at Host Fest, but it fills up fast; so you want to make your reservations now. There's a daily rate of \$55 per night or \$155 for 4 nights in the East Gravel lot (which includes complimentary coffee and donuts daily, access to showers and bathrooms, 30 Amp service and shuttle to the main doors of the Norsk Hostfest. There's also a \$225 package for 5 to 10 nights in the VIP Paved Lot and it includes all of the above, plus 2 tickets to the Wednesday 1 pm show and 2 tickets to the Tuesday night RV social.

Recipe for this month: NORWEGIAN SCHOOL BREAD

Skolebrød (pronounced sku-lah-BREWD) is a custard filled, coconut topped Norwegian cardamom sweet roll whose name roughly translates to "school bread". Whether you're looking for something new for your breakfast line-up or to try your hand at Scandinavian baking, these deliciously delicate sweet rolls are sure to delight!

For the custard filling:

- 1 vanilla bean
- 1/2 tsp vanilla extract
- 3 egg yolks
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 tbsp cornstarch
- 1 cup milk

For the dough:

- 1/3 cup butter (room temperature)
- 3 1/4 cup all purpose flour
- 1/3 cup granulated sugar + 1 tsp
- 2 tsp cardamom
- 1 cup milk, warmed
- 1 packet (2 1/4 tsp) instant yeast
- 1 egg

For garnishing:

- 3/4 cup powdered sugar
- 1 tbsp water
- 1 cup sweetened, shredded coconut

- 1. Scrape the seeds from the vanilla bean.
- 2. In a small saucepan, combine the vanilla extract, sugar and milk for the custard filling. Cook, stirring frequently, until almost boiling.
- 3. In a small bowl, whisk together the egg yolks and the cornstarch
- 4. Pour some of the hot milk mixture into the egg, whisk, and pour the mixture back into the saucepan.
- 5. Continue to cook until the custard thickens to a pudding-like consistency.
- 6. Pour the custard into a bowl, cover with plastic wrap pressed down against the surface of the custard and refrigerate until ready to use.
- 7. In the bowl of a stand mixer, combine the warm milk, 1 tsp sugar and yeast. Allow to proof for 5 minutes or until frothy.
- 8. Add the flour, remaining sugar, cardamom and egg to the bowl.
- 9. Using a dough hook, knead the dough on medium for 10 minutes.
- 10. With the mixer on low, add cubes of the room temperature butter.
- 11. Knead on medium until a smooth, elastic dough forms (about 10 minutes).
- 12. Place the dough in a greased bowl and allow to rise in a warm place until double in size (about 1 hour).
- 13. Divide the dough into 12 pieces. Gently roll each piece until a smooth ball forms.
- 14. Using your finger or a spoon, create an indent in the center of each.
- 15. Allow to rise in a warm place on parchment paper lined baking sheets until almost double in size (about 30-40 minutes).
- 16. Spoon a few tablespoons of the custard into the center of each roll.
- 17. Bake at 420F for 10-12 minutes, or until golden brown.
- 18. In a bowl, whisk together the powdered sugar and water to form a glaze.
- 19. Pipe the glaze onto the cooled sweet rolls and coat with shredded coconut.

NORWAY NEWS

More than 20,000 soldiers from nine NATO countries just finished military winter exercises in northern Norway, Joint Viking 2023. Air defense exercises over Oslo were also included in the military exercises. Russia's war on Ukraine has shown how important preparedness and well-trained military forces are especially for a strategically important country like Norway.



Most of the soldiers who participated in Joint Viking were from Norway, but they're joined by troops from Canada, France, the Netherlands, Great Britain, Germany and the US. Sweden and Finland are also participating, after deciding to move away from decades of military neutrality and join NATO.



The Norwegian government apologized Thursday to reindeer herders after activists spent a week protesting a wind farm that they say hinders the rights of the Indigenous Sami people in central and Arctic Norway.

Formerly known as the Lapps, the Sami are believed to have originated in Central Asia and settled with their reindeer herds in Arctic Europe around 9,000 years ago. They traditionally lived in Lapland, which stretches from northern parts of Norway through Sweden and Finland to Russia.

Across the Arctic region, the majority live on the Norwegian side of the border. Between 40,000 and 60,000 Sami live in central and northern Norway.

They once faced oppression of their culture, including bans on the use of their native tongue. Now they have their own parliaments, schools, newspapers, and broadcasts in their own language on national radio and television. The nomadic people live mostly modern lifestyles, but still tend reindeer.





Norwegian electric car owners have a word for the way they feel when they look nervously at their battery indicators while driving in subfreezing weather: "rekkevideangst", or "range anxiety". With temperatures often falling below zero, rugged terrain and long stretches of remote roads, Norway may not seem like the most ideal place to drive an electric car, whose battery dies faster in cold weather. In the cold season, how much range electric cars lose depends on the model and how low the temperature gets. The electric car uses much more battery when it is parked outside in temperatures that can reach minus 15 degrees Celsius and it can take quite awhile for it to go back to normal consumption.



Now more and more new electric cars have systems for pre-heating the batteries, which is very smart because you get more range and because if your car is heated before you charge, it will also charge faster



Prince Harry has been quoted as saying that the Norwegian and Dutch royal families have been leading by example amid his royal row with his own British Royal Family. The Duke of Sussex said: "I genuinely believe the best thing for the monarchy is to modernise, especially because of their role in the commonwealth. In the last couple of months, the king of Norway and the king of Netherlands have led by example, and I congratulate them for that, enormously, and I don't think they have been given enough credit for what they have done. But it is huge, and more of that is needed."

This comes as he lashed out at his own family and the British press, through multiple channels including a Netflix series, interviews, and his book "Spare", for not fully accepting his mixed-race wife, Meghan Markle.

Opening this spring 2023 is The Treetop Walk. You will want to put this 1-km-long Tretoppvelen wooden boardwalk in Hamaren Activity Park in Fyresdal, Norway on your bucket list. The walk goes all the way to the summit of Klokkarhamaren, where the path ends in a viewing circle 45 metres in diameter.

Also in 2023, The Norwegian Coastal Express Route is celebrating its 130th anniversary and Hurtigruten is announcing two brand new cruises along the Norwegian coast. The Svalbard Express is an iconic journey that takes you between Bergen, the North Cape and Svalbard. For the first time in the 130 year history of Hurtigruten, The North Cape Express will sail from Oslo and Bergen to the North Cape and back. If you do not experience the Aurora Borealis during your voyage, you can get a new cruise for free!

In 2023, you can also take advantage of the new summer schedule on The Arctic Route by Best Arctic, a bus network that takes you safely and comfortably between Narvik, Lofoten, Vesterålen, Senja, and Tromsø.

"STORM - The Dragon Legend"



Opening in late April is a NOK 100 million monster roller coaster at TusenFryd theme park, the first of its kind in Europe. It's called "Storm – The Dragon Legend", and is an Inverted Triple Launch Coaster, which means that it accelerates three times during the ride and you are suspended below the track at speeds of almost 100 km per hour, with a height difference of 33 metres!
