We held a Zoom Lodge Meeting. There were 33 plus attendees. Board Officers Appointed as of January 1, 2021 for a one year term: Gary Carr - President, Ross Haugland - Vice-President, Holly Nickiforek - Treasurer, June Ruzas to remain a third term as secretary.

Due to Covid 19 the board agreed to extend their term by one year (a third term) instead of holding an election, normally to be held this year. Extending to a third term follows recommendations made by Sons of Norway International. Assuming the pandemic will end, it is expected that usual election process will be in place next year. We have had great interest from members willing to join the board in various roles and those have also been appointed. New opportunities will open in the new year. All were welcomed and thanked for their contributions.

Salmon has been spawning in the creek at Hatzic. That's quite a sight. Park volunteers have been removing invasive plants within the park. Repairs on the park water system are getting wrapped up. A tree service has been removing unsafe and nuisance trees within the park in preparation for winter storms. The park has a winter caretaker, Nick Johnson. We are still looking for a permanent park manager.

Those who had bunads enjoyed wearing them on these special occasions. We spent the evenings visiting and laughing around the dinner tables laddened with Norwegian decorations! Kaffe followed with Norwegian cakes and cookies. We all miss that but I hope next Christmas will be better. In the mean time, we want to stay safe by following the Covid 19 regulations.

The article below is a true account of a Christmas in Norway in 1959. I hope you enjoy it. Keep your memories close to your heart!

Christmas in Norway, 1959

My family and I arrived in Norway by ship in October, 1959. This was my first wonderful taste of my father's homeland.

From the coast we boarded a train to go inland. We were welcomed into his family's home in Seljord, Telemark.

The snowy days of December were cool and so short; the nights were long and so very dark.

I remember cuddling into my fluffy feather quilt in a dark upstairs bedroom heated by a cast iron stove fed with birch wood. The fire glowed through the tiny stove window and danced in mid air to its own crackle. Such a hypnotising yet comforting feeling!

The smell was unforgettable. The home we shared with my two



aunts, an uncle and my bestemor suddenly was full of merriment as Christmas was coming! My aunts spent days in the kitchen baking and cooking; sending out the most delightful smells. Can you remember the delicious smells of krumkaker, goro, sandkaker, pepperkaker, kardemommebrød, Julekaker and bløtkake? How exciting for an 8 year old!

My uncle, who was home from his tree felling camp in the mountains, cut wood and hauled it into the house daily. He sat in his easy chair tap-tapping his pipe onto the porcelain ash tray with a moulded figure of Lassie on it. I brought this from Canada as a special gift for him and was so very pleased that he loved it so much! You could tell by the smile on his face and the twinkle in his eyes that he was thoroughly enjoying the hustle and bustle of the women in the kitchen.



The fir evergreen was ushered into the house and decorated with vintage glass balls and bells. Candles were balanced on the branches. The top was adorned with a precious colored glass steeple. Excitement was in the air!

The long table was next to be prepared. A crisp white tablecloth, along with the other fineries of Norwegian porcelain and Telemark silver were lovingly placed

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just right on the table. Candles were positioned down the center. Once again delicious smells drifted out of the kitchen; this time it was the aroma of roast pork and cooked vegetables. The crystal goblets were filled with home-made tomtebygg (a type of beer). Skål! Oh, what a feast we had!

Wonderful gifts were handed out. I remember with fondness the beautiful Norwegian sweater and solje I received. (I still have them)! The day ended with “night” coffee. Bestemor would go around to each of us and with a nutcracker, crack pieces of hard brown crystal sugar for our coffee. Such sweetness!

This delightful Christmas childhood memory remains with me and I will treasure it always.

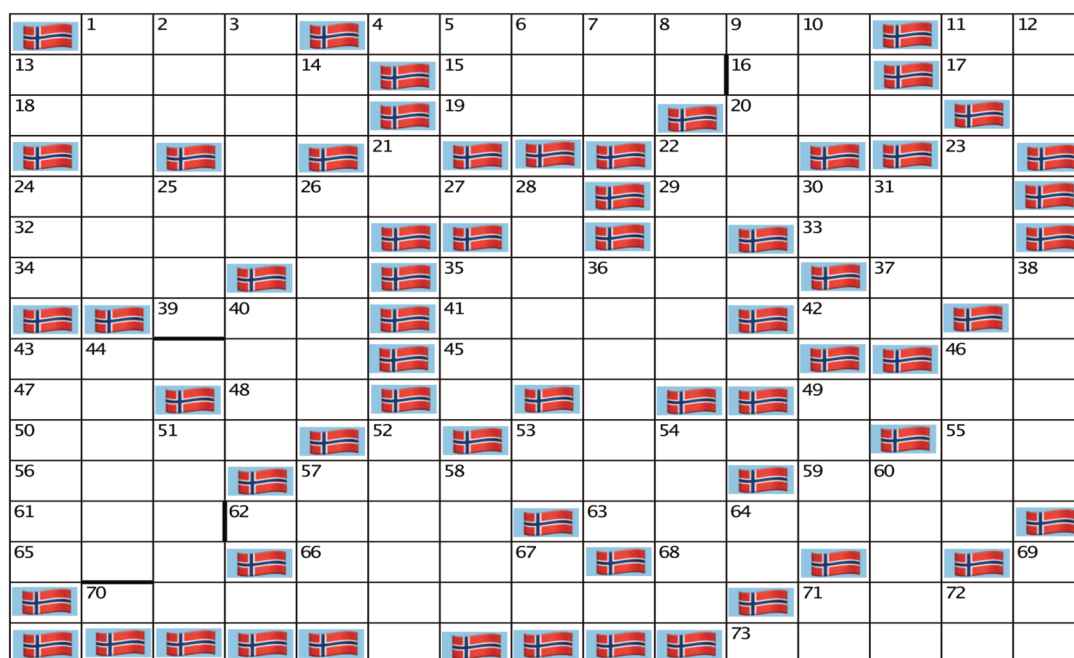
Since I have no lodge activities to report from since last Leiflette, I decided to make a crossword this time;

Since the news is so minimal, at this time, I have been digging up some history of our members ancestors and the affiliation to Norway and Canada.

Shirley Grayston a very active and long time member of our lodge, shared with us, her excitement of becoming a Great Grandma for the second time. This led to a few questions and a little history. Shirley's parents both came to Canada in 1927 from Bagn, Valdres, Norway, landing in Quebec, and then on, by train to Edmonton, Alberta. Both of them secured jobs there and worked on their English skills. On October 11, 1928 they were married in Edmonton and pursued a honeymoon beyond measure. Daring spirits they were, they embarked on a trip, travelling to the Peace River area to file on a homestead and prove it up. Both, once again, found jobs to make it through the win-

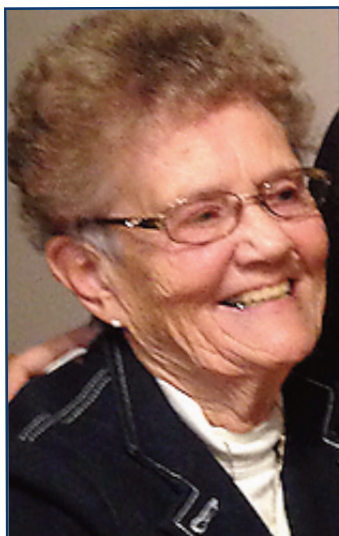

ter. Then in the summer of 1929 they worked for a farmer, near Dawson Creek. Their first home- stead application was abandoned, but a second one happened about 30 miles west of Dawson Creek (in the Groundbirch area).. This was home and they started work to make it so. Many years of clearing land,,farming, trapping, fishing, hunting and doing what- ever to make money to support their family of four. Shirley was number 3. While Dad was away for weeks or months, Mother tended to everything.. So now we are down to the fifth generation, and a proud legacy. I am includ- ing some photos of the genera- tions. 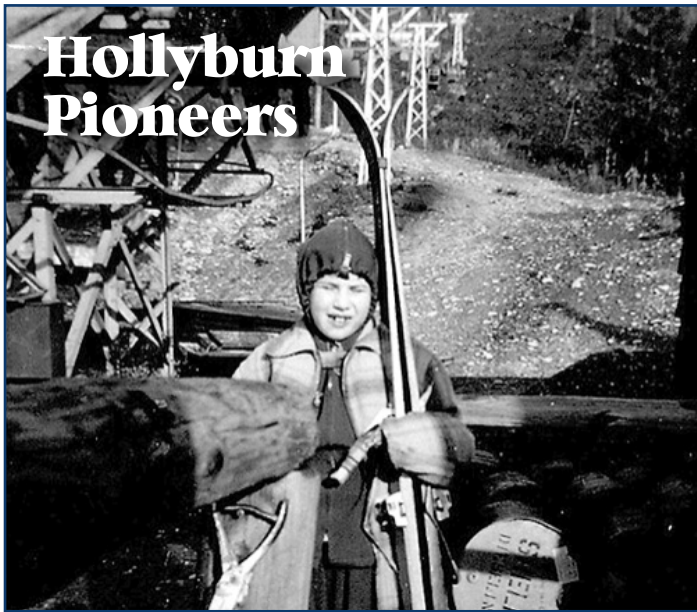

My mom and dad, Chris & Myrna Engh, built our cabin on Hollyburn in 1936. We spent most of our weekends at the cabin in my younger years until about 1963.

My dad is a Hollyburn pioneer. He first went up Hollyburn in 1926. He was one of the early Ski Jumpers, along with **Tom Mobraaten, Henry Sotvedt** and **Nordahl Kalldahl**, all from **Kongsberg, Norway** and dad from **Grorud/Oslo, Norway**.

All were championship Ski Jumpers in the Pacific Northwest. Tom was a member of Canada's Olympic Ski Jumping Team in 1936 and 1948.

My mom, a teacher, is also a Hollyburn pioneer. She skiied on Hollyburn in 1928. One winter she took her Grade 5 students up the mountains to learn to ski. As the saying goes, the rest is history! P.S. If you ever visit **Kongsberg**, visit the fantastic **Ski Museum**. Many of **Tom Mobraaten's** trophies are displayed there.

Christmas in Ryley

W11 was in its second or third year and we were now living in Camrose, Alberta, after emigrating from Unity, Saskatchewan. Christmas was drawing near and my sister Joyce and I were excited with great anticipation for in one more day we would be journeying to Ryley, Alberta. It was always great to visit with our cousins.

Our Lillo cousins owned a very nice house in Ryley which was large enough to host Christmas dinner for all the relatives that would be able to attend. Grandma and Grandpa Sundlie

also lived in Ryley along with Aunt Borghild and her young son, Gordon.

Eventually the day of Christmas Eve arrived for us to journey to Ryley. Dad put blankets, hot water bottles, snow shovels and a set of tire chains into the '36 Chevy car and we headed north. We arrived in Ryley after about 1½ hours of travel. We jumped out of the car, got hugs from the aunts and were off into the snow banks to play with our cousins.

When we finally entered the house we were greeted with the aroma of cigar smoke, dense blue eye-stinging cigar smoke. All the men would be smoking cigars. This must have been a ploy to cover up the penetrating smell of lutefisk. This was the only time of the year my dad smoked

cigars. The rest of the time he smoked roll-your-owns.

The main dinner was on Christmas Eve. My Grandma, aunts and mother would have been in the kitchen for hours preparing the meal. Some of the delights were made at home ahead of time and brought to Ryley. The table would be set with all the Norsk dishes imaginable, including a wooden keg of pickled herring my grandfather had ordered from Norway. The dried lutefisk came from Norway in wooden boxes with straw around it. One thing that did not come into the house was Gammelost. It was divided up in the woodshed because my aunt Martha could not stand the smell of it.

About 8 pm Julenisse would



come in the back door with presents for all the kids. He had a squeaky voice, (I imagine it was disguised). As you can imagine there was a shortage of sleeping spaces so I slept with my cousin, Milt, and my sister, Joyce, slept with cousin, Fern.

On Christmas Day all the kids stayed indoors to play with their newly acquired toys. Later in the day, after having left overs for lunch and tidying up, big things happened. Musical instruments were 'exhumed' from their black leather 'coffins'- instruments such as banjos, accordions, ukuleles, guitars, violins, a sax and a jews harp. After Christmas carols were sung, my grandparents would start the Dikken song, then all the aunts and uncles would join in, singing in harmony in Norwegian. Music would be played into the wee hours of the morning. We children would go to sleep listening to music of the 1940's

Most all of my Christmas' have been enjoyable but the Ryley ones were the most memorable.
