LODGE FOUNDATION FUNDRAISING

I have a tendency to retain a lot of, in my mind, important documents. I kept in my files a document that National Foundation Director, Gloria Benazic, distributed in 2010 on Recruitment and Fund Raising. I have taken the liberty of adapting one idea to fit in with something you can easily do at a Lodge meeting or a special Pot Luck etc.

LOONIES ON PARADE

It is important to make sure your Lodge members are aware of why this event is taking place. I suggest you have a picture displayed of a Bursary recipient, a group or event that the Foundation sponsored.

Ask your members to bring their **LOONIES** to the meeting or Fund Raising event.

Members line up with a loonie in hand. The "Auctioneer" secretly determines the time limit of maybe a minute on a cellphone timer setting (each new round can be a different time limit) and holds the "loonie pot". It will be a surprise when the alarm rings. Members begin placing their loonie in the pot, one at a time. The member placing the last loonie in the pot when the alarms goes off gets the prize. This process can be repeated several times over the course of maybe 10 minutes. Members are eligible to compete in as many parades_as they want. The Lodge treasurer can have a roll of loonies members can exchange for paper money if a member has forgotten to bring their loonies. This can be on the same context as Musical Chairs.

The prize can be something like a nice small plant.



It is always so rewarding to hear of a very busy young person who is involved in many activities along with their Studies. One such person is 2019 Bursary Recipient, Dylan Viste. Dylan is in his second year of studies in the Medical Science Faculty at the University of Calgary with the intention of becoming a doctor. His interest is in the field of Pediatric Medicine. He has a very demanding work schedule but finds the time to serve as treasurer for the Medical Sciences Student Association and in January became the Financial Secretary for his Sons of Norway Lodge Valhalla No. 04-341, Calgary and is always ready to volunteer for Lodge events.

Dylan is part of the group of students at the University of Calgary welcoming the first year students and their parents as they prepare to move into residence. He noticed a young man who was alone and just had a duffel bag. Dylan approached him to offer assistance and it turned out the young man was from Norway and knew no one in Calgary. Dylan took this man under his wing, offering him advice about life at the University and the City of Calgary in general.

It is hard to find something new to report on for Syttende Mai because we all know the Constitution was agreed unanimously by the Eidsvoll assembly on May 16, was signed and came into force the next day May 17, 1814.

It is tradition for children to be in the forefront of the parades. The majority of Norwegians will parade in their bunads, the national dress that indicates where you were born. These bunads and jewelry are very expensive and are meant to last a lifetime and passed from one generation to the next. One tradition I came across is that each generation should embroidery their initials and date on the inside hem of the skirt thereby creating and passing on the history of their bunad.

Because these bunads are so valuable one Norwegian bank offers a 24-hour bunad insurance just for May 17th.
