Canadian Birkie Ski Festival

I've told you many times about the Birkebeiner which is a three-day (February 10-12) celebration of cross country skiing and Nordic legend. The Edmonton Birkie is one of only three Birkebeiner Loppets in the world – Norway and the USA host the other two. The Birkie celebrates the famous rescue of Norwegian prince Haakon Haakonsson by a group of people who were called Birch Legs (Birkebeiner) because of the birch bark tied around their lower legs. Our member, Barry Oram, did the short start last year and this year is doing the long start (55 km.).



There was discussion recently at the Laft Hus about "Jack Rabbit Johanson", the legendary cross-country skier. We've had a few members who knew him. There's been some controversy over riskrem (rice cream) and I've been asked to put the proper recipe in the newsletter. Some people think it's the same as rice pudding, but it is not.

RISKREM (Rice Cream)

34 cup white rice (not Minute Rice)

1 tsp. salt

1 liter milk

½ cup sugar

1 tsp. almond extract

2 cups whipping cream

(whipped & sweetened to taste)

1 tsp. almond extract

½ cup almonds, chopped

1 whole almond



Cook rice and salt in milk in double boiler until rice is soft and mixture is thick, about 1 ½ hours. Add sugar and almond extract. Chill. Add chopped almonds and 1 whole one (The lucky finder of the whole almond traditionally receives a marzipan pig). Stir in whipped cream. Serve with red fruit sauce.

Red Berry Sauce

8 oz. raspberries (or you can use strawberries or cherries) 1/4th cup sugar 2 tbsp. water Add all ingredients to a saucepan. Mash the berries and cook over medium heat. Once it reaches a boil, cook for about 5 mintues. Then strain the sauce through a fine mesh strainer and set aside to cool. As the sauce cools, it will thicken (or you can add a tiny bit of corn starch to thicken). Once cooled, pour over riskrem and enjoy!

NORWAY NEWS



Norwegian energy company Equinor said Wednesday it made its first commercial natural gas discovery in its territorial waters for the year, a discovery that will extend the life of a current field by several years. The Norwegian Petroleum Directorate, the nation's energy regulator, confirmed the discovery in the northern waters of the Norwegian Sea near the existing Irpa field. Companies there were drilling a wildcat well to find reserves in unproven areas.

Norway's Arctic archipelago of Svalbard, a popular tourist destination, is in the midst of recording its mildest January in 90 years. Climate researchers think temperatures will keep on rising, so officials are trying once again to restrict tourism because of its contribution to climate change. The tourism boom of recent years has brought more flights, more cruiseships, and consequently more carbon emissions. It's become common for cruiseships to anchor in various arms of the fjords around Svalbard, and keep their engines running while passengers are shuttled towards land in smaller boats that also burn fossil fuel. There's simply too much of it now in the pristine Arctic, and officials are calling for much stricter regulation.

An interesting little tidbit: Mjøstårnet translates as "the tower of lake Mjøsa". The building is named after Norway's biggest lake, which is 100km away from Oslo.

Our global population is getting older. By 2050, the OECD predicts that 30% of people worldwide will be aged 65 or over. While some countries are relatively prepared to handle this increase in the elderly demographic, others are already feeling the squeeze and struggling with the challenges that come with a rapidly aging population. Which countries are the best equipped to support their senior citizens with retirement security?

The 2022 Natixis Global Retirement Index (GRI) report shows Norway at the top of this year's ranking for several reasons. For starters, it achieved the highest score in the Health category, largely because of its high average life expectancy, which is 83 years old, or 9 years longer than the global average. Norway also has the highest score of all the countries for Governance, a category gauged by assessing country corruption levels, political stability, and government effectiveness.

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






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Betty has a new business card and finally got the framework up for a new greenhouse, which is more than twice the size of her old one. She hopes to have it ready to use this spring!
