The Norwegian Laft Hus Festival June 22 was a resounding success, and we guesstimated there were about 500 people attending.



PUBLIC PROGRAMMING

On Heritage Day Monday, August 5, from 10:00 to 4:00 the Red Deer Museum is putting on a free Hootenanny in Heritage Square. There will be folk music by 6 local musicians, an artisan market featuring 10+ vendors, a selection of food trucks, old-fashioned games and races, art activities, and more! The Laft Hus will be open and will be the Green Room for the musicians.

Then on September 7 there will be another free Festival in Heritage Square put on by the Central Alberta Historical Society from 11:00 to 4:00. There will be a tipi, actors, games, dancers, musicians, artisans and food trucks. The Laft Hus will be open as this will also be our Culture Days event.





TRAINS IN NORWAY

Norway's railways are serviced by three operators: Vy (rebranded from Norwegian State Railways in 2019), SJ (a Norwegian subsidiary of Swedish Railways) and Go-Ahead Nordic. Railways run from the south as far as Bodø in the north, and west from Narvik towards Sweden.

Norway's trains are pleasurable with porter service on selected stretches. Premium tickets include hot drinks and light refreshments. Longer itineraries feature trains with cafe service with everything from Norwegian chocolate and freshly baked goods to traditional Norwegian 'kjøttkaker' (meatballs) and local beer.

There are a couple top attractions in Norway that you can only reach by train. Finse, the highest point on the Oslo-Bergen railway, is one of them. Legends such as figure skater Sonia Henie and polar explorers Fritjof Nansen and Ernest Shackleton have travelled here for training purposes. The battles on the planet Hoth in the Star Wars movie The Empire Strikes Back were shot here.

There are sleeper trains between Oslo - Bergen, Oslo - Trondheim, and Trondheim - Bodø. However, I understand these night trains can be very bumpy and uncomfortable.

The Norient Express, the Norwegian equivalent to the Orient Express, is set to debut in 2025. This electric train plans to take travelers in luxury on a 6-day journey from Bergen to Trondheim. It has a high-end interior, observation deck, gym and a focus on sustainable and comfortable travel. The trains are designed using natural, Norwegian materials, providing passengers with an authentic and eco-friendly experience.

The only true high-speed train within Norway is the airport train (Flytoget), which shuttles between Oslo Airport (OSL) and the city centre in just 19 minutes. A high-speed train also makes it possible to get from Stockholm to Oslo in about five hours.

I found the history of the Golden Train interesting as well:



During World War II, Norway undertook a secret mission to transport its gold reserves from Oslo via the trainline to Åndalsnes as part of efforts to safeguard national assets from German occupation, sending it to safer locations, including overseas destinations such as the United Kingdom. The gold was disguised as mundane cargo, and secret routes were used to evade enemy patrols and checkpoints. Norwegian resistance fighters played a crucial role in facilitating this secret operation, united to undertake a perilous train journey through the stunning Romsdalen terrain.

RECIPE CORNER

It's blueberry season, so here's a recipe for you:

BLUEBERRY CHEESECAKE COOKIES

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- ½ teaspoon baking powder
- ¼ teaspoon baking soda
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup sugar
- 10 tablespoons unsalted butter, softened
- 1 egg
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- ¼ teaspoon almond extract
- ½ cup sour cream
- 1 ½ cups fresh blueberries
- 4 ounces cream cheese, cut

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper.
- 2. Whisk together flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt in a medium bowl. Set aside.
- 3. Beat sugar and butter in a large bowl with an electric mixer until light and fluffy, about 2 minutes. Mix in egg, vanilla extract, and almond extract until well combined. Add in 1/3 of the flour mixture and stir until just combined. Stir in 1/2 of the sour cream. Continue alternating additions of the flour mixture and sour cream, beginning and ending with the flour mixture, stirring until just combined. Do not overmix. Gently fold in blueberries and frozen pieces of cream cheese.
- 4. Drop 1 1/2 tablespoon-sized balls of dough onto the prepared baking sheets about 2 inches apart.
- 5. Bake in the preheated oven until the bottom of the cookies just begins to brown, 15 to 18 minutes. Cool on the baking into 1/4-inch pieces and frozen sheets for 5 minutes before removing to a wire rack to cool completely.

SAMI

The name comes from what the Sámi call themselves, sámit or sápmelaččat. In Norway they were previously called "lapper" or "finner," similarly "lappar" in Sweden and "lappalaiset" in Finland.


The Sámi are often known in other languages by the exonyms Lap, Lapp, or Laplanders, although these are considered derogatory terms by some, while others accept at least the name Lappland.



There's a new Sámi National Theater and Sámi High School and Reindeer Husbandry School designed by Snohetta located in the outskirts of central Kautokeino, Norway. The new facility will be dedicated to reindeer husbandry, traditional Sámi handicraft - duodji, culture, art, and storytelling.

Going in three different directions, the shape of the building is inspired by the innermost joint of the reindeer horn (highly valued by the Sami). It's the part of the horn that symbolizes different qualities and strengths but also represents two elements that unite. In fact, the name of the project Čoarvemátta comes from the Sámi words "čoarvi" and "mátta", meaning "horn" and "root". While the exterior resembles a cloth covering a wooden structure enclosing the space inside a lavvu, gathering the activities in the building under one surface.


You can check out in our library this new book about Sami Folklore and Legends. We also have it in the butikk to purchase.




The Viking teaching kids about the armour.

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
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
